## EDUCATION IN NURSING.

THIS education is taken before entering the Wards; a probationer's time being too much occupied with ward work to admit of time for theoretical teaching.

1. PRELIMINARY EDUCATION.—No Candidate will be eligible for the Courses of Instruction until she has satisfied the Managers as to her knowledge of grammar, composition, spelling, dictation, reading, writing and arithmetic.

2. PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION.—The first Course will consist of at least:—

- (1) Ten Lectures and Demonstrations on Anatomy.
- (2) Ten Lectures and Demonstrations on Physiology.
- (3) Ten Lectures and Demonstrations on Hygiene.

Candidates will require to pass an Examination on these subjects at the conclusion of the Course.

3. Only those who have passed the above Examination will be eligible for further instruction. If elected, they will attend a second Course of Lectures and Demonstrations, extending over two months, and consisting of at least:—

- (1) Twenty Lectures and Demonstrations on Surgical Cases.
- (2) Twenty Lectures and Demonstrations on Medical Cases.
- (3) Twenty Practical Lectures by the Matron and Housekeeper on Ward Work and Cookery.

Candidates will require to pass an Examination on these subjects at the end of the Course.

4. The Fee for the first Course will be £2 2s., and for the second £3 3s., and will be allocated by the Managers.

5. In selecting Probationers, the Managers will give a preference *ceteris paribus* to those Candidates who have passed the above Examinations. The period of training and residence as Probationers will be two years. The salary will be £12 for the first year and £20 for the second year, with board, lodging and washing. At the end of the two years, the Probationers may present themselves for a Final and Practical Examination, on passing which they will receive Certificates as Trained Nurses.

6. The Managers reserve power to limit the number of those who may attend the Courses of Instruction.

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7. The Courses of Lectures and Demonstrations will be delivered and Examinations held twice a year at least.

8. The Lectures and Demonstrations on Anatomy, Physiology, and Hygiene will be given in St. Mungo's College; the other Lectures and Demonstrations in the Infirmary.

9. The Teachers and Examiners will be appointed by the Managers. There will be two Examiners on each subject, and one of these may be the Teacher of that subject.

10. School Leaving Certificate will suffice (as to preliminary examination? *Ed.*) The Classes occupy from Two to Three Months, during which time the Pupil provides board and lodging at her own expense.

The Lectures will begin on January 10th, 1893.

## SYLLABUS OF THE FIRST COURSE.

ANATOMY—PROFESSOR HENRY E. CLARK,  
M.R.C.S., F.F.P.S.G.

The Lectures will be delivered on Tuesday and Thursday evenings at 7 o'clock.

The Course will consist of Twelve Lectures, and will embrace the description of the bones, joints, and chief muscles of the body, the course of the main blood vessels and nerves, and the broad outlines of the anatomy of the brain, and of the thoracic, abdominal and pelvic viscera.

The lectures will be illustrated by diagrams, casts, and recent dissections.

Oral and written examinations on the subject matter of the Lectures will be held during the course.

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
