RCN Neuroscience Forum

Introduction:

The RCN Neuroscience Forum seeks to promote best practice in all aspects of neuroscience care across a range of settings from community to critical care environments, including all neurological conditions and disorders. We develop educational and other materials for nurses, health care support workers and allied health professionals to improve the quality of compassionate patient care, influencing changes in neuroscience care that will benefit both patients and nurses. The forum aims to engage members who work within neurosciences to support their activities of practice development.

Membership of the forum:

Brief summary on the forum membership, to include:

- Any trends - Increase/decrease of membership on previous year with commentary on what may have attributed to the change – Forum in 2024 - 2941, now 3089. Increase of 148, more than last year.
- 100 followers on Bluesky – only opened this year following closure of Twitter page.
- 555 members on Facebook group – up from last year.
- Committee membership – vacancies, number of applications this year -we had one vacancy which we filled.

Reflections on 2025 (Outputs and outcomes)

FCC projects submitted and approved:

- Development of Nursing Competency and Education Framework for the Management of Headache Disorders.
- To be published December 2025.
- Evaluation of RCN Career Framework for Stroke Nurses
 - Completed evaluation of the RCN Career Framework for stroke nurses – awaiting final approval and publication.
- Delivered a well-attended workshop on applying the RCN UK Career Framework for stroke nurses at the UK Stroke Conference 2025 in Aberdeen on 25 November 2025.
- Established a Stroke Expert Reference Group to review stroke resources – this work is currently ongoing.

Congress

Main highlight/s of the year for the forum

Engagement at RCN Congress. Success of forum webinars, planning of the upcoming conference, the development of a new publication - Nursing Competency and Education Framework for the Management of Headache Disorders and the evaluation of the Stroke career framework. The impact of the work undertaken by the forum for the RCN membership supports ongoing career development, training, promoting excellence in nursing care and raising profile of Neuroscience nursing.

- Conference for student nurses on careers in Neuroscience Nursing next year. This would fit with our agenda to try and up our student nurse recruitment and fits with NHS England's ambitions to encourage early career nurses to consider neuroscience.
