#### Karen Sanders London Representative on the UK Learning Representatives Committee

The most recent RCN Joint Representatives Conference took place between Thursday 29th and Friday 30 September 2016 in Cardiff. The conference aimed to explore new ways in which RCN representatives could be 'Engaging and Influencing for Change at all Levels; in order to improve the working lives of RCN members and, in doing so, enable them to continue to deliver high quality patient care.

The Conference provided multiple opportunities for

members to network with other representatives and RCN Staff, share ideas, reflect and further develop their representative role(s).

Lisa Turnbull from RCN Wales helped members understand the key actions and activities that enabled RCN Wales to achieve the Nurse Staffing Levels (Wales) Act 2016. Members were encouraged in groups to use the RCN "Ask, Listen and Act" questioning and influencing tool to explore how they might engage members and influence

employers and government for safe staffing levels in their own workplaces.

Chris Cox, Director of Membership Relations, RCN outlined the RCN's commitment through the RCN's new "Valuing Rep work", to improving its support for representatives to ensure that you feel better valued in their role. Following Chris's presentation members were asked in groups to discuss how the RCN could better celebrate and value the work that representatives do. This piece of work has provided the RCN with a rich and valuable resource highlighting "what matters to Rep's" and a Framework for Action.

Chris also highlighted the importance of the RCN collecting evidence of representative's activity in preparation for the impact of the Trade Union Bill. Members were asked to consider how the RCN could start to collect evidence (case studies) to help the RCN demonstrate the value of RCN representatives to government, the public, employers, and the media in order to challenge negative perceptions around the value of trade unions.

Lara Carmona, Associate Director – RCN Policy, International and Parliamentary department shared her aspirations for links into the workplace through the RCN representative's community. Members were asked in groups to reflect upon what they had learnt from Wales around trade union influence.

The conference concluded with a presentation from Stephen Robertson, Chief Executive Officer, Big Issue Foundation. Stephen shared how The Big Issue Foundation engages and influences,

building strong relationships at all levels to tackle the complex issues that make it tough for rough sleepers to get what they need to improve their situation, thus helping individual vendors to gain the skills and confidence to go out and sell to the public and how the organisation, as a whole, gains support from the public, businesses and the government. Members were encouraged to reflect on their journeys home, the lessons learned by the foundation

The next conference will be held from the 2nd to 3rd March 2017. The venue is to be confirmed shortly.
