Tackling antibiotic resistance

Tackling alcohol misuse

Tackling the problem of antibiotic resistance is everyone's responsibility and an important part of this is being well-informed. As such, Cochrane UK have been running a campaign to shine a spotlight on Cochrane evidence which supports decision-making in the appropriate use of antibiotics.

Researchers in the NIHR Collaboration for Leadership in Applied Health Research and Care (CLAHRC) South London have worked with the Health Innovation Network to produce a resource pack which aims to help NHS hospitals and commissioners tackle the burden of alcohol-related admissions.

- a new tool may help identify more patients at risk of developing pressure ulcers
- · checklists are no substitute for experience in spotting patients who are deteriorating
- drug reduces deaths from bleeding after childbirth
- talking therapy given by parents shows promise for childhood anxiety disorders
- long-term oxygen therapy shows no benefit for moderate lung disease.
