

Developing research priorities

The James Lind Alliance (JLA) brings patients, carers and clinicians together in Priority Setting Partnerships (PSPs) to identify and prioritise the Top 10 uncertainties, or unanswered questions, about the effects of treatments. The aim of this is to make sure that health research funders are aware of the issues that matter most to patients and clinicians. PSPs that are currently seeking your input include:

- advanced heart failure
- nutritional screening and malnutrition
- bleeding disorders
- health care associated infections
- psoriasis.

The NIHR has opened the first funding call for its brand new global health research programme. The funding programme will commission research to benefit the health and wealth of the poorest people living in low and middle income countries, typically through interventions for prevention of ill health and optimal disease management.
