Research priority setting

The James Lind Alliance (JLA) brings patients, carers and clinicians together in Priority Setting Partnerships (PSPs) to identify and prioritise the Top 10 uncertainties, or unanswered questions, about the effects of treatments. The aim of this is to make sure that health research funders are aware of the issues that matter most to patients and clinicians. Recent areas in which research priorities have been identified include:

- learning difficulties (Scotland)
- lichen sclerosis
- multiple conditions in later life
- physiotherapy
- psoriasis
- rare inherited anaemias.

Research training

The NIHR doctoral fellowship is a threeyear full time award that supports individuals to undertake a PhD in an area of NIHR research. This fellowship may be taken up on a part-time basis.
