Clinical academic careers

Health Education England (HEE) and the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) have launched a new predoctoral level training scheme to support aspiring clinical academics. The Predoctoral Clinical Academic Fellowship (PCAF) supports early career researchers who wish to develop careers that combine clinical research and research leadership with continued clinical practice and clinical development.

Spreading innovation

Against the odds: successfully scaling innovation in the NHS, is a joint report from the Innovation Unit and the Health Foundation. The report identifies a shortlist of 10 innovations that have successfully spread across the NHS in recent years, drawing out insights into how scale might be more effectively pursued and supported in the future.

The National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) funds research through its nine programmes, which include Health Technology Assessment and Health Services and Delivery Research.

- <u>Evidence synthesis applications, Public Health Research programme</u>, closes 27 March 2018.
- Mechanisms of action of health interventions, closes 27 March 2018.
- Exercise therapy for people with pulmonary hypertension, closes 28 March 2018.
- Identification of older patients likely to require enhanced care on discharge from hospital, closes 28 March 2018.
- Sepsis, closes 28 March 2018.

The National Institute for Health Research Dissemination Centre (NIHR DC) critically appraises the latest health research to identify the most reliable, relevant and significant findings. Recent examples include:

- head position after acute stroke does not affect disability outcomes
- <u>skin-to-skin contact improves breastfeeding of healthy babies</u>
- pilocarpine improves dry mouth caused by radiotherapy
- placing wet gauze on babies' tummies speeds up urine collection
- heel casts do not improve heel ulcers in diabetes.

Research support

The NIHR Clinical Research Network (CRN) will be extending support into health and social care research taking place in non-NHS settings, such as studies running in care homes or in hospices. The CRN will also be able to better support research into public health, for example in schools and other community settings.
