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

MORUZZI Interim Specialist Midwife Perinatal Mental Health. Cardiff and Vale University Health Board

Cara gives the highest level of care to women with significant mental health illness during pregnancy. She was central to the development of a midwife-led clinic alongside the perinatal psychiatrist and obstetrician, providing continuity of care to prepare them for birth.

She independently completed stabilisation and skills training, helping her to build a workshop for women in her care, and she maintained effective links between the perinatal midwife network and the All Wales mother and baby unit.

Cara stepped into the interim specialist midwife post for perinatal mental health at short notice in 2021, but her passion and dedication guickly became clear.

Perinatal nurse colleagues said Cara "shows genuine compassion for the women and is respectful of individual women's needs and cultural and social differences." A perinatal pharmacist commented that she "has a great way of speaking with women and reassuring them, especially those with serious mental illness." This included a woman who had attempted to take her life during pregnancy.

Cara truly cares about her work and is passionate about improving outcomes for women and their families. The panel felt she used lived experiences to be credible and human.



REBEKAH **MURPHY**

Deputy Sister, Cardiff and Vale University Health

Rebekah made a major contribution to recognising sepsis in under one-year olds, developing a specialist paediatric observation chart specifically for them.

As a deputy sister in the paediatric emergency unit of the University Hospital of Wales, Cardiff, Rebekah shares responsibility for the emergency care of approximately 100.000 children in the region, with her unit the major trauma centre for south Wales.

Her role with the paediatric sepsis working group enabled Rebekah to fully recognise the importance of identifying sepsis across the first year of life. She designed a chart with a colour coded early warning score to allow users to recognise risk of illness and deterioration. It also gives staff guidance for escalation procedures for those with a higher score.

After approval from clinical board quality and safety groups, implementation began in December 2021. Rebekah delivered training and supported staff throughout the transition, and the paediatric observation chart is now embedded into practice. Early recognition helps to reduce mortality and morbidity through early intervention and treatment.

Rebekah's passion and professionalism was demonstrated in dedicating her own time to complete the project so implementation could begin as soon as possible, swiftly ensuring the best outcomes.

Community Nursing Award



LOUISE HYMERS

Macmillan Lead Nurse for Cancer and Palliative Care, Powys Teaching Health Board

Louise is a visionary nurse leader for community palliative care. She is responsible for implementing CARiAD, a responsive, timely and person-centred care package first introduced to the community of Powys in 2020.

CARIAD involves the carer-administration of subcutaneous (SC) medication for common breakthrough symptoms of people who are dying at home. It allows patients to stay at home and receive improved quality of care from informal carers in the last days of their life.

As a Macmillan Lead Nurse for Cancer and Palliative Care, Louise is passionate about improving end-of-life care. This was reflected in evidence showing CARiAD's positive impact in timely end-of-life symptom control across the rural county of Powys, which has no 24-hour district nursing service.

Louise has increased the ability of people to remain at home for end-of-life care, with carers feeling empowered and valued in their role. Her change implementation skills have inspired community teams across the region.

She demonstrated true foresight and dedication to rural community needs in response to the challenges of COVID-19. The panel felt that Louise introduced a way of working that was, "truly game-changing". Feedback from relatives has called her work, "a godsend".



Sian and Bianca established the Minor Injury/Same Day Urgent Care (SDUC) service in Cardigan Integrated Care Centre, a Welsh Government-funded new-build.

Data collected over three months at the start of 2021 showed 756 people presenting, but not admitted, to emergency departments in Aberystwyth, Carmarthen and Haverfordwest, lived within 20 miles of Cardigan Integrated Care Centre. Of those, 618 could have had their needs met by an SDUC service led by an advanced nurse practitioner.

Clinical Lead Nurse, Sian, and Advanced Nurse Practitioner, Bianca, have driven the new service for local care. They recognised that a whole system approach is essential, collaborating with health and social care colleagues from the start, involving expertise already at the centre.

Their efforts have given patients access to care closer to home, and reduced the pressure at general hospital sites. Attendance currently averages 60 patients per day, and the service also has the flexibility to provide an outreach service when required.

The transformational service reflects Sian and Bianca's tireless commitment to improving SDUC in local communities. The panel said they have challenged traditional ways of working through a real passion for delivering effective care, closer to home.

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Improving Individual and Population Health Award



TRACY **EVANS**

Clinical Nurse Specialist, Homeless and Vulnerable Adults, Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board

Tracy has been vital to improving health outcomes and access to services vulnerable for groups, including those experiencing homelessness. She developed new and improved ways of supporting people with highly complex needs, giving expert support and healthcare coordination.

In post since June 2021, Tracy has shown exceptional positivity and leadership, partnering with local authorities and third sector housing providers. She develops effective working relationships, collaborating across three local authorities with hostel and temporary housing staff, as well as a Welsh Government-funded outreach team.

The network of positive connections Tracy established helped to ensure that people receive appropriate evidence-based care and support, when it was not perceived as accessible before her appointment. She has worked to connect people with an array of services, including, but not limited to, general practitioners, mental health and community drug and alcohol teams, podiatry, sexual health clinics, and vaccination teams.

Tracy's adaptable approach to respond to individual needs is clear. One example of this is how, alongside local charities, she undertook early-morning breakfast runs for homeless people, and provides care on the streets. By building relationships, she gains trust and makes a tangible difference.



SHARON **WEBBER**

Public Health Specialist Midwife, Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board

Sharon established a maternity smoking cessation service as a core service across Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board.

Data collected by the health board in 2019 indicated that 22% of pregnant women were registered as smokers, while a independent maternity review 2019 highlighted the link between smoking and stillbirth. The review recommended that communication was improved to prevent delays in identifying high risk cases along with associated mortality and morbidity.

Changes led by Sharon's work mean a public health congratulations letter now gives pregnant women the information to self-refer, encouraging early access to the smoking cessation service. New Carbon Monoxide monitoring at every stage, including postnatal, has detected issues including passive smoking and faulty boilers. Midwifery support workers address general health through activity as a distraction technique, offering stress balls and pedometers.

The panel was impressed by how Sharon demonstrated a robust approach to the application of evidence-based practice and data in the smoking cessation service, improving health outcomes for mothers and babies. She showed how she engages the team and wider healthcare professionals, enabling them to make every contact count in improving individual and population health.

Nurse Advisor - Learning Disabilities, Mental Health & Learning Disability Commissioning Healthcare Team, Hywel Dda University Health Board

Acute Learning Disability Liaison Nurses, Swansea Bay University Health Board

A registered Learning Disabilities Nurse since 1984, Melanie has worked for the last ten years in the Mental Health and Learning Disability team as a Continuing Health Care case manager.

Melanie responded to the needs of her patients and their families to help people with profound and multiple learning disabilities at a time of crisis in the pandemic.

People with profound and multiple learning disabilities are a small group with significant needs, often cared for at home by their families who sometimes struggle to access support.

During the pandemic, community services and respite were reduced, leaving families isolated and struggling.

It became clear that many feared their children may end up in specialist units far away because there were no suitable local options.

Melanie contacted providers and found an opportunity in a new development for a small, dedicated unit. She also identified a small group of compatible people to prioritise for these beds.

She then worked with families and their care coordinators to develop individual plans.

Several have now moved into the unit and are doing well. Melanie has helped address any issues quickly and continues to link with families and listen to any concerns. Judith and Bethan developed the Acute Learning Disability Liaison Service across Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board.

The service promotes individual and holistic patient care to improve health experiences of people with learning disabilities, who often face barriers in accessing good health care.

As Acute Learning Disability Liaison Nurses, Judith and Bethan have worked tirelessly through the challenges of the pandemic to raise the profile of people with a learning disability and highlight their needs.

As well as giving clinical support, they have supported health staff and provided training.

They contributed to a clinical policy, 'People with a Learning Disability Accessing Acute Secondary Care', translating Welsh standards into a health board-wide policy.

They developed a learning disability page on the staff intranet, and are now piloting a Reminiscence/Rehabilitation and Interactive Therapy Activities (RITA) system, allowing patients to use apps and games to reduce their stress.

Judith and Bethan also developed sensory boxes for different wards and departments and are working with a graphic design student to improve the design of the learning disability information boards.

These are having a very positive impact for people with a learning disability coming into hospital especially in helping them to feel calm and reduce distress.

ANDREA DORRINGTON

Lead Nurse for Urgent Primary Care, Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board

Andrea was the lead nurse in establishing a Community Respiratory Hub to provide immediate symptom relief or palliation for patients experiencing breathlessness, agitation, anxiety, pain, or delirium because of COVID-19.

Her leadership in rapidly establishing this new service at the outset of the pandemic was critical to its success. The achievement is even more impressive because she was continuing her day job as Lead Nurse for Urgent Primary Care and worked clinically as part of the GP out-of-hours service as an Advanced Nurse Practitioner.

The Hub enabled many patients to stay at home for care, and it extended management plans and treatment to care homes, district nurses and paramedics caring for patients with confirmed or suspected COVID-19 in the community.

Many aspects of the Hub's service have now been embedded into GP out-ofhours delivery and core service delivery, so patients can remain at home and receive timely pain relief at end-of-life in line with Welsh Government strategy.

Andrea's enthusiasm for nursing at every level and developing teams with inspirational leadership shows how linking different roles can help to improve patient care.



NATALIE JANES

Senior Nurse Primary Care Clinical Services, Aneurin Bevan University Health Board

Natalie is an innovative and positive senior nurse, whose work as lead on the oxygen (O2) service has helped prevent admissions, reduce emergency GP contacts, and ensure respiratory patients receive the right care in the right place at the right time.

Natalie and her respiratory team go above and beyond expectations, ensuring patients requiring respiratory care are individually supported and receive high standard of safe care 'closer to home'.

She supported the All-Wales O2 Respiratory Health Improvement Group to design unified documentation, standard operating procedures, and robust risk assessment by working collaboratively with teams including the Fire Service.

During the pandemic, Natalie ensured over 1,000 patients receiving oxygen were contacted, assessed, and advised via virtual platforms. Where there were social isolation and other risks, patients were referred to services including meals on wheels and Community Connectors.

Natalie and her team also provide accredited training on respiratory conditions. As a result of her enthusiasm and excellent leadership, the respiratory team have gained support from the Queen's Nursing Institute and Bevan Exemplar to continue the work across Primary and Community Care.

The panel was impressed by Natalie's honesty in her leadership style, showing insight and self-awareness and considering her own wellbeing and that of her staff.

Nicole and Roisin have jointly delivered the Post Organ Donation Hospice Care Pathway, a project that has the potential to make a significant improvement to the care provided to families whose child is at end-of-life and where organ donation is being considered.

They work for Tŷ Hafan and Paediatric Critical Care (PCCU) in University Hospital of Wales respectively, and the panel was impressed that they had achieved so much despite having not met in person until the day of the Nurse of the Year interview – their many previous meetings were all virtual because of the pandemic.

The project is grounded in Nicole and Roisin's innate understanding of the needs of families in this traumatic situation and underpinned by national guidance.

Tŷ Hafan provides end-of-life care to children and their families including postdeath care at the hospice for up to 48 hours. The PCCU team recognised the hospice's unique environment and that the busy PCCU is not always the most conducive place to meet families' needs.

They also recognised that by offering this enhanced holistic support at $T\hat{y}$ Hafan, including the option for more meaningful time to say their farewells, that more families may engage in donation.

After intensive collaboration with colleagues over 18 months, they launched the care pathway in March 2022.

Kerri is an inspiring, dedicated Paediatric Oncology Outreach Nurse (POONS) working across Hywel Dda University Health Board.

The panel described Kerri as "empathetic, passionate, innovative and a truely transformational leader in this field of nursing who demonstrates excellent leadership and long-standing commitment".

Since being in post, she has developed her skills and expertise and always goes above and beyond for the children, young people and families under her care.

Kerri is a keen innovator and her work is underpinned by up-to-date research and evidence base. As part of her MSc in Palliative Medicine at Cardiff University, she has undertaken a small research study investigating the role of the POONS in providing bereavement care to families.

Kerri has been influential on leading on the implementation of local policy, guidance, and documentation for nursing staff for the Paediatric Oncology Shared Care Unit in Carmarthen.

During her quality improvement module as part of her MSc, she identified a concern locally around the safe administration of chemotherapy in the community and the need for pumps to improve patient safety and quality. Kerri is currently working in partnership with the clinical device training team and senior management to make improvements in this area.

TARA REES

Lead Hepatology Clinical Nurse Specialist, Cardiff and Vale University Health Board

Tara demonstrated her passion for improving patient experience by creating new services for those with specialist needs. She recently produced a successful business case to set up a hepatocellular carcinoma service for patients with endof-stage liver disease. The new service is a major step for a patient cohort who will have access to a key worker for the first time.

This achievement followed her establishment of the first community clinic in Wales to treat viral hepatitis C patients, and her creation of the hepatology clinical nurse specialist role.

As Lead Nurse Practitioner for the Hepatology service at Cardiff and Vale University Health Board, Tara is a clinical expert in the field. She has worked at an advanced level to advocate for a vulnerable patient cohort and has dedicated her career to building new services.

Tara applied her leadership responsibilities to practice and policy, interpreting new developments and guidance, and innovating service for better patient experience. She has also led on national accreditation for her hepatology service and been lead nurse for the All-Wales Liver Disease Delivery plan.

The panel felt she made an outstanding contribution to patient care and team development.



TRICIA ROBERTS

Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder Clinical Nurse Specialist, Hywel Dda University Health Board

Tricia pioneered work in the field of adult Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) services in west Wales. She established services from scratch, fostering hope and positivity around acceptance and equality among the workforce and service users.

Constantly striving for innovation and development, while adhering to Welsh policy, strategy and NMC standards, Tricia understood the limited support and treatment available for those living with ADHD. She diligently juggled service development, line management, training, and the clinical day-to-day work of nursing.

Tricia was instrumental in every policy and proforma needed by a specialist service, from referral form to prescribing guidelines. She carefully considered relationships with the health board's clinical governance, often working beyond her remit to ensure safe and fair working conditions, and effective service provision. As the team more than doubled in six months, her leadership skills were vital.

Tricia took direct action to benefit service users, taking courses and other learning opportunities in her own time. Gaining a non-medical prescriber qualification helped her to expand the service and reduce waiting times for people beginning treatment.

Her compassion and care shone throughout the services she helped to deliver.

Early Years Bladder and Bowel Assistant Practitioner. Cardiff and Vale University Health Board

Kelly ensured that cognitively impaired people in Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan received outstanding care and support during their admission.

As the first link worker appointed to the memory team, Kelly undertook essential activities with people experiencing cognitive impairment or post-operative delirium. She embraced this extremely challenging patient group, laying the foundations for her newly created role.

Her activities have included colouring, jigsaws and music, as well as tending to physical, mental and wellbeing needs. Kelly was rewarded by the joy of her patients when she painted their nails, plaited their hair, or gave them a shave, so they felt more comfortable, even if their surrounding environment was frightening and overwhelming at times.

When one patient became agitated about the death of his granddaughter, and the idea of being unable to attend the funeral, Kelly proactively made enquiries about whether she could attend the funeral with him, before arranging for it to happen. This helped to stabilise the patient. She also arranged for a patient's dogs to be brought onto hospital grounds as he was upset about being in hospital and away from his pets.

The panel recognised Kelly's passion and absolute love for her job.

Heather reduced the distress experienced by children and their parents and carers around childhood continence.

As the early years bladder and bowel assistant practitioner (EYBBAP) at Cardiff and Vale University Health Board, Heather gave appropriate care, advice, and support in the community. She worked tirelessly to develop the service and reach as many children and families as possible.

In giving preventative, early intervention care and support around toilet training and continence. Heather aimed to achieve equity of health outcomes. She gave education and training to early years settings in the community, such as children's centres, preschools and nurseries, ensuring continuity of care. She also gave one-to-one support in the home, building trusting professional relationships.

The contribution she made to overall health and wellbeing was pivotal at a time which can be extremely challenging and upsetting. Her support helped to reduce the waiting list for the paediatric continence service and helped to increase the number of fully toilet-trained children starting nursery or school.

The panel saw numerous examples where Heather's work led to significant impact and improved outcomes for children, and it was clear that she continually strives for excellence.

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Supporting Education and Learning in Practice Award

HAYLEY

Hayley and Carla developed educational programmes to train allied health professionals (AHPs) and local authority care staff to identify and escalate concerns about skin damage, especially in elderly and frail patients.

They led a task and finish group which has resulted in 50 AHPs and 70 care staff from the Bridgend area completing the educational programmes, leading to skin damage being identified earlier and treated sooner.

Because many patients are now supported at home without necessarily having a routine review from a community nurse, skin damage can sometimes go unreported.

Hayley and Carla identified a high number of skin-damage incidents from those teams dealing with frail patients and found there was no formal skin integrity training for AHPs and care staff.

They overcame many barriers to develop a training programme, and the local authority appointed an educational partner to provide ongoing support and supervision.

There has been a significant improvement in skin damage awareness and knowledge, with many more referrals to community nursing by these colleagues and shorter stays with the community nurses because skin damage is detected and treated earlier.

Hayley and Carla have shown determination to deliver this change, which has meant positive outcomes for patients and an increased confidence and knowledge for staff.



LAURA LITTLE

Fetal Wellbeing and Surveillance Specialist Midwife, Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board

Laura is the first fetal wellbeing and surveillance specialist midwife in Wales. She is an effective leader and innovative practitioner, who is committed to improving midwifery services, educating staff, and improving outcomes for babies.

Among many innovations in her role at Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board, Laura has co-ordinated and organised the training and implementation of a new system of cardiotocography (baby heartbeat) monitors and developed a training group for qualified maternity staff.

She also co-founded and is chair of the Fetal Monitoring Network Group which includes representation from all health boards in Wales.

She has been instrumental in introducing physiological interpretation of fetal monitoring into the Health Board, devising and adapting a new interpretation tool to enable the transition to a fully physiological approach. She has collaborated with each obstetric unit to revise reflection meetings to adapt to the challenges from the pandemic.

Laura's work has received national recognition by the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists and British Medical Journal, for developing a virtual platform to facilitate reflective learning.

Senior Lecturer, Adult Nursing, Cardiff University

Diana is thoroughly committed to two key educational areas - cultural awareness in educational programmes and delivering the Return to Practice (RTP) programme.

She works hard to ensure equality, diversity and inclusion are championed in Cardiff University's School of Healthcare Sciences and conveyed to students through innovative and engaging sessions.

Diana has developed and led a new Global Health module on the Bachelor of Nursing programme, promoting equality and diversity in health care settings on a local, national and international level.

She recently made a successful case for the purchase of diverse skin-toned manikins to show sunburns and keloid scarring, and she has recorded role-play sessions related to honour violence.

She champions the importance of considering people's cultural values, beliefs and practices when providing care, and she likes to explore experiential and fun ways of learning and seeing students feel excited, even when the subject matter can be difficult.

In April 2020, in the first lockdown, Diana managed the new approved RTP and rose to the challenge of switching the programme from face-to-face to blended learning in a matter of days.

The panel feel sure her passion will continue to inspire others for many years.



NELSON SELVARAJ

Lecturer, Adult Nursing and Numeracy Lead (Nursing), Cardiff University

Nelson's leadership of undergraduate numeracy for nursing students at Cardiff University has seen a huge increase in passes at the first attempt.

By encouraging students to enjoy mathematics and not to be afraid of it, the percentage passing the exam first time increased by a third - from 64% to 86%, and he is working to increase it further.

Numeracy is vital to support safe medication practice, and Nelson wants to improve his students' understanding so they become confident professionals in an area of practice that many struggle with.

The panel was impressed by his enthusiasm, motivation, and passion – qualities which were recognised with a student-nominated Lecturer of the Year award in 2019.

He supported teaching and education to health board staff to work in the critical care environment at the onset of the pandemic, enabling more registered nurses to support critically ill people in hospital. He has also worked in vaccination centres.

Described as kind, caring and compassionate, Nelson is a role model to students and colleagues alike. His constant positive professional attitude provides exemplary evidence of leadership in support of students and colleagues.

NIA SHEEHAN

Student Nurse (Mental Health), Swansea University and Hywel Dda University Health Board

Nia has shown exceptional pride in her work as a student nurse and has made a major contribution to transforming mental health support locally.

As a fluent Welsh speaker, Nia recognised the mental health and care needs of a rural population and has successfully introduced a health clinic, providing access to support for mental and physical health and social needs.

Being a student nurse through COVID-19 has come with many challenges but Nia has proven herself to be an integral member of the team, embodying the standards and values of the Hywel Dda University Health Board by showing exceptional clinical ability, dedication, care, and compassion.

When the pandemic struck, Nia worked as a student in a front-line service. This was especially challenging so early in her studies, and also Nia has three children, one with complex needs who was required to shield.

During her training Nia took the lead role in organising a One-Stop Health Clinic for patients suffering severe and enduring mental health problems.

Service users often feel too vulnerable to attend their GP for general health checks but are comfortable in this setting. Nia has worked tirelessly to create a bilingual environment of dignity, respect, and compassion which service users feel properly heard and seen.

Team Leader/ Sister, Critical Care, Cardiff and Vale University Health Board

Assunta (Sunny) planned and implemented a project which has improved patient flow and discharge from critical care services.

Sunny is a Band 7 Team Leader and Flow Co-ordinator in Critical Care in Wales' only Major Trauma Centre, where patients have advanced respiratory, renal, neurology, neurosurgery, spinal and polytrauma, cardiology, vascular and other high-risk surgical conditions.

Because of limited capacity, some critically ill patients have not been able to access intensive care units (ICU). She collaborated with colleagues to understand the capacity issues on wards when discharging patients from critical care and strengthened links with the patient access department which led to more early daytime discharges to the ward so medical teams were available for patient reviews.

More timely and appropriate ICU patient discharges have reduced rebound admissions, improved admission flow of patients, and ensured patients receive critical care therapies when needed.

The project now includes a dashboard system to keep patient details, admissions, planned discharges and flow through the unit up to date in real time.

This project's success is due to Sunny's innovation, determination and tenacity. It has led to an improved patient journey, and increased access to critical care for those needing it most.



JUDITH JAMIESON

Senior Nurse Manager, Outpatients Development, Powys Teaching Health Board

Judith has made an outstanding improvement to the outpatients' service in Powys through her innovation and strategic thinking.

As sister in the outpatients' department in Brecon, she has turned what was considered a 'Cinderella service' into a vibrant and efficient system which would be transferable across Wales. She always puts patients first and ensures that any individual needs are met in a nonjudgemental way through telephone triage in advance of appointments. This has led to reduced waiting times for outpatient appointments for both vascular and ophthalmic services.

Judith has tackled rural health inequalities by working with neighbouring health boards to ensure patients throughout Powys can access the same outpatients' service. She was instrumental in setting up a new service for patients who may have developed age-related macular degeneration. The service assesses and treats during a single visit with continued follow-up as required. Because it is local, it reduces travelling and waiting times.

She recognises personal diversity across the population and has tackled workforce challenges by completing a skills analysis to meet service demand and recruiting to deliver, maintain and improve the service.

Judith's colleagues greatly value her compassionate leadership style and her ability to provide a voice for both patients and staff.

SARAH MORRIS

Practice Development Midwife, Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board

Sarah made transformational and sustainable improvements to training and development for multi-professional emergency procedures.

As Practice Development Midwife in Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board, she led the successful implementation of PROMPT (Practical Obstetric Multi-Professional Training) Wales, across all university health boards.

Over 95% PROMPT compliance was achieved in 2020 and 2021, with COVID modifications required, and a recovery plan deployed to maintain high compliance.

Sarah was instrumental in ensuring that evidence from incidents and governance reviews were triangulated and used to provide learning opportunities within PROMPT programmes. She identified practical system improvements in clinical environments, such as wall flipcharts showing algorithms.

She reviewed evidence around shoulder dystocia detection and demonstrated how robust training and scrutiny of data is leading to better services for women, pregnant and birthing people, and their families.

By co-developing PROMPT Wales through local introductions, the equipment carried by community midwives has been standardised. Welsh Ambulance Service team collaboration has improved through study days, with paramedic attendance and a paramedic course faculty.

Sarah is passionate about quality, safety and patient experience, regularly identifying gaps and generating new ideas. Her transformational work enabled greater scrutiny, compliance, and staff development opportunities.



DR AUGUSTA STAFFORD-UMUGHELE

Workforce Culture, Diversity & Inclusion Manager, Hywel Dda University Health Board

Augusta helped Hywel Dda University Health Board to understand and learn more about issues being faced by staff from the global majority. Her work on secondment in the organisational development team has deepened awareness of cultural, diversity and inclusion issues, and built greater trust among staff from the global majority.

She hosted listening exercises with nursing staff, some of whom had never come forward to speak about the subject before, and influenced changes to the support of nurse development pathways. This included preparing for interviews and recognising the importance of community and cultural issues, particularly those affecting Filipino nursing staff.

Augusta's work has helped to develop trusting relationships with nursing staff from the global majority, which means more can be learnt and changes can be made to the work culture through openly considering conscious and unconscious bias. Her networking and influencing skills have led to a significant number of nursing staff joining the Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic Staff Network, giving a more powerful collective voice.

Augusta has the courage to speak truth to power to affect change. Her unique style has persuaded those in authority to respect her intentions, resulting in systematic improvements and an enhanced culture of diversity and inclusion.

Innovation and Digitalisation in Nursing Award



CATHERINE CAWTE

Immunisation Team Leader for School-based Vaccinations, Cardiff and Vale University Health Board



MANDIE WELCH

Lead Heart Failure Advanced Nurse Practitioner, Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board

Cath rapidly developed a new way of digitally capturing consent from parents and guardians for vaccinations.

In spring 2021 the Welsh Government mandated the Fluenz immunisation programme to include all children and young people, meaning an increased offer from 40,000 to 68,000 children aged five to 16, across 188 schools.

As the immunisation coordinator for skill-mixed school nursing services, Cath undertook immediate collaborative work with the digital lead and child health directorate, reviewing existing process to design an in-house option for use within six weeks.

Their goal was a digital solution capturing consent and enabling the school nursing team to add information. Data capture at the point of vaccination was required, and the solution needed to be compatible with other systems.

Microsoft forms were designed to replicate the Public Health Wales consent template, and response data was captured and displayed for staff. Its use with the Welsh Immunisation System allowed realtime information to be recorded in the child record.

Cath demonstrated inclusive leadership through active reassurance and one-toone training. She established weekly meetings where concerns were discussed and ideas were shared. The panel felt Cath was passionate about streamlined digital services enabling consented delivery, and reaching more children in a cost-effective manner. Mandie enhanced the service given to heart failure patients, enabling continuation of care integrating the safe monitoring of health alongside safely optimised heart failure therapies.

She worked with HUMA Therapeutics, a fellow heart failure nurse and two cardiologists to develop a software application.

Their collaboration resulted in software that captured data including symptoms, blood pressure, weight, heart rate and oxygen saturation. Clincians could review the data to help them make quick decisions about patient care and identify early signs of deterioration. A pilot study revealed that the intervention could also reduce medication optimisation time and enhance patient experience.

The new service led to avoided admissions and enabled early discharge for patients who could be safely monitored at home. It helped clinicians find patients needing extra tests or earlier treatment.

Mandie managed a study group in which the optimisation of heart failure therapies was achieved in an average of 28 days, a 75% reduction in optimisation time compared to standard care. Patients agreed the software improved communication, helped manage their condition, and gave reassurance.

Mandie successfully navigated the implementation of change, and a new intervention, with positive outcomes for heart failure patients. Her innovation has been shared locally, nationally and internationally.

Supporting Improvement Through Research Award



Judith has a passion for research and evidence synthesis, and throughout her career she has consistently gone above and beyond her role to positively impact nursing knowledge and enhance patient care.

A nurse since 1984, Judith's career has spanned critical care and practice nursing (PN). In 2001, she moved into academia and developed a programme for PN training in leading BSc Community Gwent. programmes in Cardiff and Oman and becoming Professional Head Primary Care/ Community Nursing and Director of Postgraduate Provision at Cardiff University.

Since then, she has extended her impact through research, having led and collaborated on national and international studies as principal or co-investigator, funded to the value of £796,370.

Judith was Director of the Wales Centre for Evidence Based Care (WCEBC) from 2010-2021, and the impact of its work in that period has been wide-ranging, including feeding into Welsh Government policy.

Her research has also resulted in improvements in patient care further afield, having led projects with institutions in Zambia and Malawi.

Judith has shared her knowledge of evidence synthesis and implementation by teaching hundreds of students and mentoring staff. She has also passed on her understanding of primary research through PhD supervision which has led to further service improvement.



DR PAUL

Senior Lecturer, Adult Nursing, Cardiff University

Paul is a dedicated and committed researcher with a career-long goal to improve patient outcomes.

A Senior Lecturer in Adult Nursing with a clinical background in critical care nursing, his work shows his commitment to making a difference in chronic conditions, putting patients' and families' perspectives at the forefront.

The panel highlighted Paul's significant contribution as a nursing leader in the field of research and clinical practice, especially for those people for whom a renal transplant has failed. His highly innovative work into the impact of ketamine on bladder health is also commendable and as is his planned research into long COVID.

Paul teaches undergraduate, postgraduate and doctoral students, and is joint Operational Group Lead for Research Capacity Building Collaboration Wales (RCBC), an all-Wales collaboration to increase the capacity and capability of research in nursing, midwifery and allied health professional groups.

An experienced research mentor and supervisor, Paul has nurtured researchers at all stages and facilitated those pursuing a research career pathway.

His passion and commitment to making a difference through research continues to transform the lives of patients, professionals, students, policy and society.

SAMANTHA NOORADEEN Lead Clinician, Anwen Care Home,

Samantha (Sam) has shown great maturity and professionalism in her lead nurse role at Anwen Care Home, planning and implementing end-of-life care in a sensitive and dignified manner.

Her organisation and supervision skills have been depended upon to maintain the right balance within the team, which is vital to delivering person-centred services for those living in, working at, and visiting the care home.

Routinely seeking to improve her skills through hands-on experience and evidence-based practice, Sam often shared learnings with her peers and colleagues. This helped to boost their own performance and connection with residents.

She took time to listen and understand individual needs and feelings, generating improved wellbeing. As a result, she has become widely respected as a role model for new employees, student nurses and peers

Sam was motivated by the challenging areas of her role, from accurate documentation to delivering personal care that made feel people feel safe, comfortable and able to have fun. Her style of managing sensitive situations around end-of-life care was exceptional, and her way of communicating made families feel secure in knowing their loved ones would have a comfortable and dignified end to their life.



AMANDA WHENT

Lead Nurse Dementia, Aneurin Bevan University Health Board

Amanda displayed outstanding commitment to raising the profile of the older person, particularly those living with dementia. Her exceptional leadership qualities have translated into major influence at strategic, clinical and community levels.

She led a formal evaluation at a community hospital to determine if meaningful activities such as introducing dementiacompanion volunteers and enhanced staff training could provide stimulation, reduce boredom and challenging behaviours, and boost staff confidence. She formed a multidisciplinary working group and welcomed an observational visit from the community health council.

evaluation The outcome generated improvement actions, involving new funding for specific activities and training. Amanda helped recruit and train over 100 dementia champions, and she developed the dementia companion volunteer role across hospital wards and care homes.

She helped to procure over 1,000 new bedside boards containing key information allowing staff to recognise when a patient has additional care needs and allows relatives to leave comments. She also supported the development of digital patient stories, which have been shared at learning events.

Amanda enabled cultural change in person-centred dementia care across the health board. Her work has embraced the National Dementia Action Plan and is an exemplar for Wales.
